ABBA Survey Results - September 2018

To comply with General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) survey invitations were sent by email to those individuals who had signed up for either information about ABBA membership, about ABBA events or just general information about the association. A total of 257 invitations were sent by email on the 7th August. and the survey closed on September the 11th.

As of September the 11th there were a total of 102 respondents who completed the online survey which represents 39.7% of the polled audience. This online survey used Google Forms and consisted of twenty one questions in five sections. The introduction to the survey was as follows:

"ABBA is at the initial stages of forming a group of like-minded individuals with a passion for botanical art and native plants. We would love to get your input at this early stage as we work with you to form a group for all that will promote its members and help them grow in their chosen passion.

Our three guiding principles are:

Every One

Every Where

Every Stage

This means the group would be open to all, from any location national or international and at any stage of artistic development.

The survey has five short sections and should take about TEN minutes to complete.




Q1. Are you interested in? (you can select more than one) - 102 responses




Q2. Are you a practicing botanical artist? (regardless of what level) - 102 responses



Q3 If you are NOT a botanical artist what attracted you to ABBA? (you can select more than one) - 16 responses




Q4. If you are a practising botanical artist where would you rate yourself on a scale of 1 - 10? - 98 responses

Q5. If you practice botanical art, approximately what percentage of your art would focus on "native" plants (a wild plant indigenous to a country)? - 98 responses









Access to a list of current flora guides that are considered to be the 'standard' guides.


Q11. Any other comments about "what ABBA could facilitate"? - 28 responses

- I hope that Abba can encourage local, regional and national interest in botany and botanical art. It would help the outsiders whose support and understanding we need if botanical artists were more consistent in their descriptions and definitions of flower painting, botanical art and scientific illustration.
- Meet up
- I am a competent field botanist, but always willing to learn more. I have run workshops on identification and would be happy to do so for artists.
- A directory of local groups would be a great idea so that new artists could 'find a home ' and tap in to the resources available
- I think that being in contact with fellow artist is important. On the educational side it should be cautious about duplicating resources that are already available such as courses at Cambridge University Botanic Garden and Kew that already cover a lot of topics. Getting this information out to ABBA members would be very valuable
- maybe they could collate an image library for people to use when they are unable to source a plant?
- To be really inclusive I'd like it to be affordable for everyone the society that everyone in botanical art is a member of! Other societies are regional or can be expensive. ABBA could be an umbrella society that links everyone and brings us together. Maybe with a ASBA style conference!
- Provide a forum that matches and liaises other national associations e.g. ASBA
- 1) Projects as a group, either locally or nationally. 2) workshops focusing on the botany in the art.
- Inclusion of artists often without support in their particular area. Joining likeminded people together, facilitating local knowledge
- Yes! I think you should facilitate compiling a full listing of all botanical groups across the United Kingdom. In fact this should be an interactive map on your website where you can zoom in and click on the local group closest to you, and there's a link to the local group's website, or contact information if they don't have one. With the right marketing, ABBA could become 'the place' to access information for the beginner/ intermediate looking to connect.

- just being in touch with other like minded people


- I already have all I need in Q8, 9, 10, but I might be able to offer advice to others regarding points in Q10



compile register of british botanical artists; advertise specific native plant projects needed input.



For now, as a beginner I would be happy to just see the exhibitions. I like botanical art very much. I have a book about the art os Magareth Mee and more Sarah Simblet books.


Opportunity to see work and perhaps buy.

- Educating children about the wonderful flora all around them and art days to introduce them to drawing the plants, whether tiny or large trees, that are around them
- Clubs
- informal meetups for drawing and painting in parks and open spaces
- Botanical field trips led by interested botanist and local enthusiasts
- On line forum/ Facebook page for questions/ connection

- Information and news, help and guidance and a network of artists and botanists. Organising live projects on native plants in conjunction with botanical groups.
- I don't think ABBA should be doing too much itself. There are many local societies and institutions running workshops, holding exhibitions, etc. The internet is a source of information about materials. Local botanical groups provide know how about native plants. Rather, it should provide an accurate directory of societies, tutors, sources of funding etc. Maintain industry standards, liaise with counterparts in other parts of the British Isles, hold seminars on subjects that impact on the botanical painting fraternity e.g. the question of customs post Brexit in trying to get work in and out of the UK. Relations must be maintained with initiatives in Ireland and in Scotland. It could encourage local groups to begin a new Florilegium of British flora to update Stella Ross-Craig and Walter Fitch.

Q18. How far would you be prepared to travel if ABBA facilitated activities in your part of the country?




Q19. Other comments about ABBA EVENTS you would like to add? - 18 responses

- Abba will do an enormous service if it can harness the collective enthusiasm of hundreds of botanical artists and supporters in an effective communication process.
- For me it will help if events are held where there are good public transport links
- I think if their are future World Wide events I suggest abandoning the 'one species-one artist' rule_select the best if there are multiple entries. Also I think the size restriction was a bit limiting but otherwise a great success / idea.
- No more thoughts at present
- Travel is the most difficult thing! Events where lots of activities happen at once are more worth travelling for but travel is definitely a barrier, both because of time and expense.
- Many of the above questions seem not to take into account existing local initiatives. There are many regional botanic gardens, with attendant courses, workshops and outings; there are also active botanical identification groups. Art materials and simple know how can easily be found on the internet.

- Because I have ticked all of them it doesn't mean that I WILL sign up for ever one, every year.
- Happy to host and /or tutor such events
- The absolute need to work with local groups in setting up, coordinating and delivering any local event: establish connections, buy-in, kudos. Reputation.
- easy access by road or rail. Same event at different venues and times
- The further away an event is from your location, the more planning there needs to be and preparation,
 publishing a calendar as far in advance as possible is very important
- advertise more widely.
- Where I live (on the North Yorkshire coast) is so isolated from current botanical art events. The majority of events are in London and/or "the south" and it was so great to have this year's exhibition, In Ruskin's Footsteps, located "north of The Wash"! I know there are some facilitators providing excellent courses in the Derbyshire area but it would be so encouraging to have one or two events a bit closer to home!
- events in the north, cheaper less hectic than London
- Informal themed online exhibitions perhaps a monthly challenge?
- None
- Events need to be more evenly distributed geographically with the exception of one, all of the exhibitions listed above are in the south of England which may exclude artists further north from participating also none of these are in Scotland / Wales. In Scotland for example there is the Royal Botanic Gardens which regularly hosts exhibitions. Also for training and workshops, flora and habitats vary considerably across Britain so it would be useful if this were reflected in events programming.
